Running Club Off to a Great Start

FRCS's Running Club found great times at their first race of the 2016 season. Runners of all ages met to compete in Fleet Feet Sport's annual Downtown Mile. The race course consisted of two loops totaling half a mile each in Chico's Downtown area. It was a beautiful day for racing, and the energy brought by the spectators was tremendous. All of our Running Club competitors hit seasonal best marks, beating their previous mile times from our early season time trial that was held on the second day of practice. Forest F was first to come in clocking a time of 6:29. Next was Quinn A finishing in 7:30, beating his old personal best by over 3 minutes. Cole B also saw a huge personal record (PR) by over 3 minutes, running an 8:48 mile. Jori G would have been right there with the rest of our runners, but unfortunately she took a wrong turn on the course and was unable to finish. We are positive she will see some big marks in the mile later this season.



State Testing – CAASPP

Towards the end of the month we will start state testing, now called CAASPP. This year we have continued to modify curriculum to meet Common Core and Next Generation Science standards; encouraging students to dig deeper, create connections across curriculum and working to prepare them for real world challenges. The new CAASPP tests require students to demonstrate the kinds of abilities they will need to do well in college and the workplace. They also require a fairly high degree of technological sophistication. As we are still waiting for our high speed internet, we will need to be creative in meeting our testing goals this year. We will keep you posted as our plan further develops. Our primary goal is to allow students to test in a low stress setting in a time frame that best meets the developmental needs of the students at each grade level. As always students do better on tests when they are well rested, well fed, and have adequate support. We will have a guest speaker that will discuss positive thinking and cognitive rehearsal as a means to decrease test anxiety. Students in 3rd – 8th grade will participate in state tests. Further information will be sent in the next couple of weeks. Please let us know if you have any questions or concerns.

Heard About Campus

Kindergarteners went for a short walk around campus this week looking for signs of spring after reading the book, It's Spring! by Linda Glaser. On our walk, we observed flowers and identified the parts of a plant. We dug up a tulip to check out what was going on under the soil's surface, and we investigated blossoms growing on a fruit tree as we briefly talked about pollination. We attempted to sit very still and quiet to catch some bird calls, but the birds were a little wary of all the playground noise. We'll try again during a more peaceful time of day! After our walk, students made beautiful acrostic poems with the word 'spring.' We also had a

kindergarten parent come in this week to do a special flower art project that will be auctioned during our music festival at the end of the school year. It turned out beautifully, so don't miss it at the auction!

The 1st/2nd Graders have a very busy month of April ahead. We have a field trip to Laxson Auditorium on April 13, the Forest Ranch Wax Museum on April 14, and our big class field trip to the Sacramento Zoo on April 22. And don't forget the Jog-A-Thon on April 15 and the Egg Drop on April 29.

Third and fourth grade students will be getting "all charged up" as they learn about series and parallel circuits in Science. Their creativity will "flow" as they create Squishy Circuits with conductor and insulator dough. In order to gain perspective on environmental issues, students will begin reading *The Owl in the Shower* by Jean Craighead George. Through study of this book, students will understand point of view with respect to environmentalists and loggers. Additionally, both third and fourth grade students are investigating fractions in Math.

Fifth graders are back from the SS Balclutha. This was a one in a lifetime experience for most of the students. They coiled ropes, swabbed decks, lowered and rowed small boats, and stayed up in the middle of the night doing night watch. A wonderful time was had by all. The next morning we went to Ghirardelli for hot cocoa. The students are now working with elements, chemical reactions, and the early colonies.

April finds the 6th graders in ancient China learning about philosophers, religion, geography, Haiku poetry, and enjoying a thematic "Dragon" day. Students are writing expository papers on an ancient Chinese inventions and having fun creating video presentations with the use of green screen technology, placing students inside their videos of the Great Wall or the Silk Road. We are

hiking Table Mountain, which includes a picnic amidst the wild flowers, visiting the Chinese Temple later in the month, and gearing up for environmental camp the first week of May.

Amazing April is upon us! The 7th and 8th grades are continuing our year-long independent research projects that will be due in mid-May. Mathematically speaking, section 2 is learning the reason why interest is so important in any major purchase. Section 3 is finishing learning about 3 dimensional figures and beginning to create independent student-taught lessons to review the year's contents. Social studies is going to war, the Civil War. We are also looking forward to our visit to the Monterey Bay Aquarium next month.

Late Breaking Science Fair News

Great news came to us too late to include in the March newsletter. FRCS student Lucy B was awarded the CSU, Chico College of Natural Sciences Dean's Award for her Chico Science Fair project entitled "Absorption of Sea Sponges vs Artificial." Each year one student each from the categories of Elementary, Middle School, and High School receive this award, which is accompanied by a \$100 check for her class to spend as they choose. Way to go Lucy!
