

From the Director

Dear Forest Ranch Charter Families,

Welcome Back! I hope everyone had a wonderful break. We are re-energized and ready to roll into the second half of our school year.

We have an exciting new reading program for the remainder of the year called "Principal for the Day." Beginning next week, students in 1st through 7th grades will get a raffle ticket for each hour of reading they complete at home or school. Every Friday morning a ticket will be chosen. The selected student will participate in a few activities with me that day. Students will be starting their second semester elective classes on January 16. We are looking for donations of thread, yarn and select materials (denim, canvas, thick material) for the sewing class. Musical students do not need to be enrolled in a Performing Arts elective. The musical is scheduled for late March and a final practice schedule will be sent home this week.

As flu season is upon us and we have multiple medically fragile students among us, we respectfully ask that families keep this in mind and take common protective actions to remain well and avoid the spread of germs. These protective actions include having your family avoid close contact with sick people and keeping your child or yourself home and away from school for at least 24 hours after having had a fever. They also include teaching your child to cover their nose and mouth with a tissue or using the inside of their arm when they cough or sneeze, proper hand washing behavior with soap and water, and to avoid touching their eyes, nose, and mouth.

Parent Education Night

Tuesday, January 13th at 7PM we are holding a Parent Education Night – *an Introduction to Positive Behavior Support*. Positive Behavior Support (PBS) is a data-driven behavior program that focuses on logical consequences, teaching appropriate behaviors, and creating strong, healthy relationships and routines. We will discuss a continuum of strategies for effectively managing/redirecting unwanted child behavior and increasing positive skills. Topics will include homework procedures, social skills and general parenting questions. Please leave the kids at home and come enjoy some time and treats with fellow parents in the school library.

Heard About Campus

Kindergarteners started the year off learning the months of the year with a catchy song. We will soon continue our thematic studies with a focus on Antarctica and the Arctic Region.

Do you hear the sound of money? The 1st and 2nd graders can! They are starting to dive deep into the world of economics. The kids will start learning about balancing money through our class economy and have their own money balance sheets. They will also learn about wants vs. needs, goods and services, consumers and producers, and having a business. Many fun, hands-on experiences are planned for these topics, including a barter faire, field trips showing farm to table, creating their own businesses and making commercials, apply for jobs, and making a simulation city where they will sell goods and/or services.

The third and fourth graders are "beefing-up" on their reading fluency. They are continuing to dig deeper into literature and seek answers through finding supporting details. Students in both classes enjoyed researching and exploring beneath the surface to learn about a different culture for multicultural night in December; they are planning to further develop these research skills as they learn more about our local area. The students are moving their cultural focus from the island country of Jamaica, to our local Native American history. Everyone is excited to begin 2015 and continue to Dive Deep into our work!

Fifth graders are jumping right into the challenging concept of fractions. They are quickly realizing how necessary it is to have a strong foundation with their multiplication facts. As they simplify fractions and find common denominators they can understand how knowing their multiplication facts help with these more challenging concepts. The fifth graders will be hosting a school wide Math Day on February 6th. Students will participate in activities, which they can later use at home, that make practicing math facts and other concepts more engaging. Children greatly benefit when they practice math at home; many of the activities are games that can be played with the entire family. Hopefully you can join us on February 6th, but if you can't make it check with your child about what they enjoyed and make time for math games at home.

Mrs. D.J.'s 6/7th grades are going interstellar while we create the solar system on our campus. We will use the field and play ground to place a temporary solar system on our campus using scale for real world mathematics and our knowledge of the distance of each of 9 planets (including Pluto) from the sun. Students will begin new literature circles, reading <u>The Island</u> of the Blue Dolphins, <u>The Trap</u>, and <u>Fahrenheit 451</u>, culminating their comprehension with a response to literature.
