## **CPR for FRCS Budget**

Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) breathes life into humans; Forest Ranch Charter School is hoping Community Partner Relationships (CPR) will breathe life into our upcoming budget. Public schools are facing yet another round of funding deferrals and reductions similar to those experienced in 2008 which resulted in the closure of Forest Ranch Elementary School.

The FRCS Board of Director's began discussions on how to handle the upcoming cuts at the March board meeting. While the extent and duration of the cuts are currently unknown, the results were still encouraging. Concerned community members attended and gave constructive input. The board, faculty and staff collaborated to identify cuts to our budget that will minimally affect classrooms. An optimistic plan for increasing fundraising was identified. If we can successfully implement the fundraising plan, harmful cuts to FRCS programs will not need to be made.

Success, defined as making further state funding cuts transparent to our students, will depend on family and community involvement. Families and community members will be encouraged to make

affordable, regular donations throughout the coming school year. Community partners will be asked to sponsor a budget line item. With your help, FRCS can continue to fulfill its purpose of providing an excellent community elementary school for Forest Ranch and an engaging alternative to CUSD for the Chico area.

## Heard Around Campus

Ms. Palmarini (K) – The kindergarteners are learning about the animals found in the Arctic region and in Antarctica. They will be sure to tell you where the polar bears and penguins live if you ask them! They have also been doing a great job learning their sight words in fun ways such as 'sight word stomp' and throwing balls at 'wall words!'

Mrs. Stearns (1/2) – The first/second combo is continuing their discovery of the physical world. Experiments using foods and carbonated drinks are a frequently messy way to learn about solids, liquids, and gases.

Sound and vibration experiments include paper telephones, humming glasses, and shoebox guitars. Gravity studies will kick off with an egg drop event assisted by our friendly firefighters and their ladder truck. Check the website for photos of this one!

Ms. Lyons (2/3) – Can you really bend light? Why would you name a road 14-Mile House or Toll Gate? These questions and others will be answered by students. A wealth of information is waiting among several community volunteers who are joining us for presentations and a discovery field trip.

Ms. Matoes (4/5) – A visit to the Hands-On Lab at Chico State kicked off a unit on Matter. The whole school enjoyed watching the Jamestown play. The class is working on a water color map and students are taking turns teaching about the various states and regions in the US. Monet's water lilies in oil pastels are the subject of a new elective rotation and are beginning to brighten up the school office.

Mrs. Jimmerson (5/6) – Science, history, and geography combine for an adventure led by Lewis and Clark over the next few weeks. Plants and animal species will be discussed and mapped along the historic route. Sixth-graders are exhausted and exhilarated from their experiences at Shady Creek Outdoor Camp. New electives are starting and the multi-cultural cooking class is working on Thai coconut soup.
