## September is Attendance Month

Chronic absence in kindergarten and first grade, defined as missing 10 percent of a school year for any reason, is associated with lower levels of third grade reading, higher levels of suspension, and lower academic achievement in middle school. By middle and high school, chronic absence is a critical early warning sign that a student might drop out. Regular attendance helps students succeed in school and is an essential future employment skill. It all starts now!

September is Attendance Month. One of our goals is to help students become the best citizens they can be. Setting a pattern of regular attendance and avoiding chronic absences is a great first step. We encourage an ongoing conversation with families experiencing attendance challenges.

## Heard About Campus

Kindergarteners had a wonderful start to the school year. They are busy making new friends and learning what this school thing is all about. We are practicing how to write our names, drawing self portraits, reading poems and learning about what we have in common and what makes us unique individuals. We are looking forward to a fun year of learning!

The 1st and 2nd graders are ready to dive deep and start exploring a healthy body and brain for their first mini-unit! Students will see how the different parts of their brain help their learning and functioning day to day. They are also going to explore the connection between how having a healthy body can actually help them in school. They will explore the 8 different smarts to find out more about themselves and will even be taking a trip to Chico Sports Club this month to explore more about having a healthy body and brain with their very own personal trainers!

The third and fourth graders worked very hard at being detectives, putting their skills to the test at solving the mystery on campus of "Who Borrowed Mr. Bear?" Ask your student for the solution. Currently they are looking forward to their trip to the Chico Farmer’s Market where they will be searching for a rainbow of fruits and vegetables. Throughout the upcoming nutrition unit, students will be looking at how food can fuel their bodies and brains.

The fifth graders are diving into their curriculum. For our water unit we are learning about the importance of water in our bodies, before learning about water on Earth. In history, we are getting familiar with the geography of the U.S.A. We will be working as a team to enlarge a USA map, which will become our history bulletin board for the year. We're even planning trips to a national park or monument to integrate math, history, and language arts. We continue to challenge ourselves with daily homework and P.E. In our
first novel, Holes, by Louis Sachar and our read aloud, The Homework Machine, by Dan Gutman, we become detectives, looking at the clues to solve the mystery and see how all the pieces fit together. Will they be able to fill in all the holes?


September is full of fun in $6^{\text {th }} / 7^{\text {th }}$ grade! Our class has gotten to know each other, established our routine and we are now kicking off the month with History and Science being immersed in living off the land. Seventh graders are covering world geography and $6{ }^{\text {th }}$ graders are focused on the U.S. In Science we are learning about the effect water has on our brains, bodies and how little of the earth's water is for drinking. Seventh graders are diving into cell theory. Our entire class will be taking a hike to Upper Bidwell Park to explore the local watershed and the history of the dam at Bear Hole. Our 7th graders have the opportunity to attend a hands-on-lab at Chico State to learn all about electricity and then return to the lab one week later to teach grades 3-6 what they have learned! Exciting! Our Literature Circles have us reading The Outsiders. The Blue Room Theater has offered to do a week day matinee just for our class to provide us with the opportunity to compare and contrast the two forms of the story line, text vs. live performance. Hang on; it's going to be an exciting ride.
